Governor Rell Announces \$135,000 "STEAP" Grant for Prospect Senior Center

Governor M. Jodi Rell announced recently that \$135,000 in new state funding will soon be available to help the Town of Prospect pay for additional parking and an electrical generator for its newly-renovated senior center.

The funding will come from the state's Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP), with approval expected at the next meeting of the State Bond Commission.

"I am very pleased to approve this funding to add parking capacity at the new and improved Prospect Senior Center," Governor Rell said. "The expanded parking will be icing on the cake, if you will, for the beautifully renovated senior center. The grant will also pay for a generator to allow the facility to be used as an emergency shelter, if necessary."

In January 2005, Governor Rell and U.S. Rep. Rosa DeLauro announced the awarding of a \$700,000 federal Small Cities grant to Prospect for expansion of the senior center at 6 Center Street. The expansion included recreational facilities, extra program space, new rest rooms, an elevator and other amenities.

A total of \$20 million has been authorized for more than 100 small towns under the STEAP program this fiscal year. The Bond Commission, chaired by Governor Rell, will meet Friday, October 6, at 10:30 a.m. in the Legislative Office Building in Hartford.

GIL Foundation by Veronica Boulden

The GIL Foundation is a private, non-profit organization that serves Connecticut residents who have special needs. GIL stands for "Grounded in Love." The GIL Foundation partners with the State of Connecticut's Department of Mental Retardation to offer citizens with special needs a variety of opportunities many people may take for granted, including residence in a comfortable home and life experiences within an excellent community like Prospect.

The GIL Foundation began serving this community in 1985 when it offered a respite program during periods of crisis for local individuals and their families. During that time, the GIL Foundation operated out of the lower level of the Prospect Town Hall.

A few years later in 1987, Joseph A. Mascia, a long-time resident of Prospect, became the Executive Director the GIL Foundation. That year, the GIL Foundation also became a full service, twenty-four-hour care provider and it developed the first community residence for individuals with special needs.

Today, the GIL Foundation has four such residences located in Prospect and in nearby Cheshire. The GIL Foundation's offices are located at 34 Waterbury Road in Prospect.

The GIL Foundation sincerely pledges four things to each individual they are entrusted with: they will care, serve, train and encourage them. By doing these things, those in their care will be able to embrace all the opportunities they are given, so they can enrich their own lives and the lives of others. The GIL Foundation insists that their service is "Grounded in Love."

Prospect Land Trust News

Fall is a wonderful time for the senses. It is the sight of beautiful colors, the smell of freshly fallen leaves, the feel of cool air on your face, the sound of geese migrating and the taste of freshly squeezed apple cider. Come join us for the Prospect Land Trust's Annual Fall Hike and give your senses a treat. The hike will be held on Sunday, October 15 (rain date October 22) at 2 p.m. and will be approximately two hours long. Hikers will gather at the cul-de-sac on Boardman Drive, off Plank Road. They will follow a section of the original Quinnipiac Blue Trail, established in 1929, and proceed to the Land Trust property near Matthew Street, and return by

way of an abandoned town wood road to the starting point.

At the end of the walk, there will be a brief program, presented by Boardman Kathan, recognizing the 100th anniversary of his historic, late Victorian home built by Albert Field. Mr. Field was the inventor of sliding curtain rods, metal buckles for firemen's raincoats, as well as arctic boots, which were manufactured in Waterbury at the Shoe Hardware Company. Cider and donuts will be served.

Vehicles can park on Boardman Drive and its cul-de-sac. Hikers should wear comfortable walking shoes for this hike, as the terrain will range from relatively easy to a moderate climb.
