All proceeds go to everyday and specialty items and little pick-me-ups to perk up their spirits. All donations are significant, from small bags of munchies to large, sweeping gestures that impact several men or women.

The Prospect Lions members will be accepting items and will have 3 drop-off sites over this month. Items may be dropped off throughout the day on October 6 at the Prospect Firehouse hall during the American Red Cross Blood Drive from 8:45 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. The other drop-off sites include Oliver's Supermarket on Saturday, October 14 and Saturday, October 28, and the Prospect Congregational Church (during all Sunday services every Sunday in October).

Suggested items include: instant coffee, flavored creamers, sugar packets, powdered Gatorade, individual water bottles, iced tea packets, powdered hot chocolate, pre-sweetened Kool-Aid, tea bags, Slim Jims, crackers, beef jerky, dried fruit, tuna, oatmeal, salsa, lollipops, zip-lock bags (all sizes), sponges, cigars, Clorox wipes, razors and shaving cream, shampoo and conditioners, soap or body wash, mouthwash, Chapstick, sun block, Skin-So-Soft, phone cards, gift cards, dental floss, liquid hand sanitizer, breath mints, batteries (all sizes), hats, journals, socks, board games, laundry detergent, dryer sheets, foam balls, soccer balls, handheld games, portable CD players, postcards.

Ethel's road was not an easy one. She had numerous, serious ailments which she met head on. She never gave in until the very end. It is difficult to believe that she taught up to the last day of school in June of this year.

During Ethel's last illness, sick as she was, she would always ask visitors as to their families and their well being. She accommodated her illness and gave time to her family and friends.

Ethel was part of Long River Middle School Region 16 teachers. Witness the teacher honor guard at her funeral and hear the teacher suggestion that Ethel's cane accompany the teachers on their yearly trip to Cape Cod. A part of Ethel will be there.

Ethel has entered that "newer world" as Tennyson wrote. She left with the love of her children (of whom she was always aware), her family and her friends.

In the words of her physician, "Ethel was an exceptional woman", and that exceptional woman will be in our memories to give us solace through the ensuing years.
